RIO 2016 OLYMPIC GAMES

THE COURT OF ARBITRATION FOR SPORT (CAS) HAS OPENED ITS TWO TEMPORARY OFFICES TO RESOLVE LEGAL DISPUTES AND DOPING CASES ON THE SITE OF THE RIO 2016 OLYMPIC GAMES

Lausanne, 26 July 2016 – The Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) has opened two temporary divisions on the site of the Rio 2016 Olympic Games. They will operate every day until they close on Sunday 21 August 2016.

The CAS Anti-doping Division

For the first time in the history of the Olympic Games, the CAS will be in charge of doping-related matters arising on the occasion of the Games as a first-instance authority. This new structure will handle potential doping cases referred to it in accordance with the IOC Anti-doping Rules. The CAS Anti-doping Division will adjudicate on these cases after hearing the parties concerned. It may also impose provisional suspensions pending the conclusion of the procedure. Final decisions rendered by the CAS Anti-doping Division may be appealed before the CAS ad hoc Division in Rio or before the CAS in Lausanne after the end of the Olympic Games.

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The CAS ad hoc Division

The CAS ad hoc Division was created for the first time in 1996 on the occasion of the Olympic Games in Atlanta. It has been established to resolve legal disputes arising on the occasion of the Games (qualification, disciplinary, doping (2nd instance), etc...). It provides participants of the Games with free access to justice rendered within 24 hours or within a timeframe compatible with the competition schedule. The decisions rendered by the CAS ad hoc Division are final.

The arbitrators retained for the CAS Divisions are all either lawyers, judges or professors specialized in sports law and/or arbitration and are independent of the parties who appear before the CAS.

The secretariat in Rio will be headed by the CAS Secretary General, Mr Matthieu Reeb, and staffed by CAS employees. In agreement with the Rio de Janeiro Bar Association, pro bono lawyers based in Rio are available to assist Games participants before the CAS Divisions.

In 2012, the CAS ad hoc Division in London handled 11 cases. In 2015, the CAS registered 503 procedures. In the first half of 2016, it has already registered 310 procedures.
